From the Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,

Elsewhere in this Newsletter (p. 5) you will find an article from Allan Sawyer, our Trustee for the "Enlistment" campaign. (Read the word enlistment as the person assigned to encourage people to make a pledge to the church). As is appropriate for the office Allan holds, the article goes over some figures— the dollar amounts— and the places to which those dollars are destined to go as we exercise our outreach programs.

When it comes to our "budget process," when it comes to asking people to make a pledge to the church, what I need you to note is not the dollar amounts involved. We generously give to a number of good organizations doing great work. But in a church, to whom we give and how much we give and what a church budget looks like is not, in any way, a primary question.

A church a budget is not a collection of dollar signs. A church budget is not a document which tells a congregation how much is received and how much is spent. A church budget should be a document about justice. That begs the question: "What is justice?"

More to the point and more specifically, the deeper question a budget should strive to ask and answer is not "what is human justice?" but "what is the justice of God?" How would God see justice and how would God have *us* see justice?

Part of what makes the issue of justice problematic is, largely, we only consider human justice. Human vision sees justice solely in terms of winners and losers.

Human vision, hence, sees justice only in terms of a game, something to be won or lost. Further, most people just don't seem to comprehend that when (quote) "justice" is demanded, the goal of human justice is the same as the ultimate answer to any game: who wins; who loses. Put the other way around, human vision turns justice *into* a game.

I would posit that God does not see justice in terms of a game—winners and losers. You see, with the justice God seeks, with perfect justice, winning and losing are immaterial.

The goal of the justice God seeks is truth, not my vision of truth or not your vision of truth, but God's vision of truth. When real truth, God's truth— God's justice is sought, picking

a winner or picking a loser stops being a goal.

I would be the first to admit this is a very hard concept for most of us to grasp—that when real justice is sought determining a winner or a loser is not a goal. After all, isn't life about who wins and who losses?

Well, in the Second Inaugural Address, given just weeks before he was assassinated, Abraham Lincoln said this about the warring parties: "Both read the same Bible and pray to the same God, and each invokes [God's] aid against the other." In fact, Lincoln also said this: "My concern is not whether God is on our side; my greatest concern is to be on God's side, for God is always right."

Does God choose sides? Clearly that is not the claim we hear in lectionary reading from Leviticus on October 26^{th} : "...do not show partiality to the poor or defer to the great..."

All that brings me back to my primary point: a church budget is not about dollars and cents. A church budget is not about balancing competing interests. A church budget should be and needs to be about justice, God's justice. A church budget should be and needs to be about being on God's side.

That presents us with another question: "How can we be on God's side?"

Stay in relationship; speak from the heart: these are holy places. These are the places to which God calls us.

Further, rather than simply pay attention to budget priorities, financial matters, we must get our hands dirty, work side by side with others as we seek the justice of God. It is when we get our hands dirty that we are empowered and enabled to tap into a sense of humility that says we, ourselves, were at one point strangers in a strange land. Getting our hands dirty means reaching out to one another in love, in trust, in humility, with sharing, with caring, with feeling.

Therefore, as Allan's letter states, among the places to which each of you has contributed by making a pledge are the United Church of Christ at the Conference level and at the National level, which empowers these bodies to engage in works of justice. Each of you has, therefore, also contributed to other agencies of justice. Head Start, the Family Support Center, Mothers and Babies Perinatal Network, The Place, School Nurses, Doctors Without Borders and Hospice—all places and people who endeavor to do the work of Justice.

This leads me to reiterate two things and add a third. First, a budget is not about dollars and cents. A budget is a document about justice. Second, the way to arrive at a just budget is through loving relationships. The added third item? Church is a place where this can happen.

So, as I often say, "see you in church"— church, a place where we seek the justice God would have us seek.

Letter from the Christian Enlistment Committee

I can't believe it is time to start the UCC Church Christian Enlistment Campaign for 2015. Time flies, I must be having fun or getting old quicker.

Our Christian Enlistment Campaign is where we solicit financial contributions from our congregation and its members. All the funds raised with these pledges are used to fund Our Church's Wider Mission (OCWM), the Susquehanna Association obligations, and our Outreach Ministries. Very simply stated, your pledges provide the financial support to pay the items found in categories I and II of the Expense section of the 2015 budget. They total \$60,250.

Last year the total pledges received were \$45,000. Our goal is to raise about \$60,000 to cover all expenses in categories I and II in the 2015 budget. That is not realistic based on recent history. We can, however, make a sufficient improvement if we set our minds to it and make a concerted effort.

Please give careful thought in this decision and pledge as generously as you are able.

Revised Common Lectionary

You may be aware that the readings used at services of worship in most Mainline Protestant churches and in Roman Catholic Churches are from the list of assigned readings known as The New Revised Common Lectionary (the lectionary having been published and revised). In our Congregational tradition, while pastors are encouraged to use the assigned readings, it's not mandatory. We will publish each Sunday's readings and some from major church feast days each month. Most assignments consist of at least a reading from the Hebrew Scriptures, i.e.: an excerpt from the Torah, the Prophets or the Writings, a Psalm, an Epistle reading and a Gospel reading. This is published in the hope that some may use these readings in their personal prayer and devotional time.



Bags Needed for Thanksgiving Turkeys

Please bring in your plastic grocery bags for use when we give out turkeys at Thanksgiving. We would like to avoid the need to purchase bags. **We will need 400 bags** in order to double them to hold the weight of the turkeys. Bags can be dropped off at the church office or left in the kitchen.

Authorized Ministry

In the two millennia of the Christian Church we have found many ways and different terms to recognize the "office of ministry." Paul, for instance, addresses "the gifts of the Spirit." What were these gifts? They were gifts used in the church to do the work of the church — all offices of the church.

One could clearly argue the two earliest "offices" were apostles and disciples. However, it's equally clear shortly after the resurrection event deacons were involved in church ministry. Perhaps as early as the Second Century of the Common Era we get what is today referred to as priests and bishops.

Language changes and as language changes we have different ways of naming ministers. The term "authorized minister" is coming into ordinary use in the United Church of Christ. Following this article is a chart which lists the total number of ministers in the United Church of Christ and breaks these numbers out into various categories.

By far the majority are ordained. The credentials of the ordained means they are empowered to work not just in the local church in the ministry of "Word and Sacrament" but to work in the whole church in ministry of "Word and Sacrament."

Just like those who are ordained, those who are licensed are approved and sanctioned by a local Committee on Authorized Ministry to an office of "Word and Sacrament." The pastors are authorized for this work in a local church but not the whole church.

A pastor with Dual Standing or an Ordained Ministerial Partner is someone ordained in a denomination other than the United Church of Christ, who still has ties with that other denomination but is currently working in and with the United Church of Christ. Hence, a local Committee on Authorized Ministry recognizes them for that work by granting Dual Standing.

Generally, local Committees on Authorized Ministry say a Commissioned Minister is someone involved with ministry in a church—ministry to the homeless, the ministry of outreach, the ministry of education. These are very significant ministries but these not the ministry of "Word and Sacrament." All that brings us back to what Paul said: that "the gifts of the Spirit" were gifts to be used in the church to do the work of the church. I hope you find the chart below interesting.
