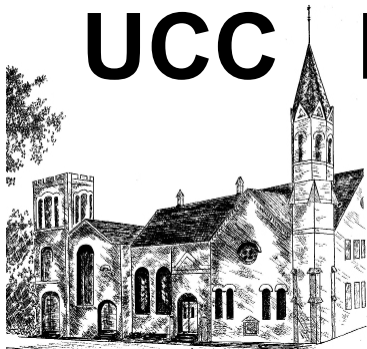

From the Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,
Happy Christmas!

No. Wait. It's too early for that. And even saying "Happy Christmas" before December the 24th is not particularly appropriate. In fact, I recommend you wait until the 25th to say "Happy Christmas." After all, just saying "Happy Christmas" totally ignores the Church Season of Advent as if it did not even exist.

Further, in the church Christmas is not just one day as some in the secular world would have it. Christmas is a season— a short season— just 12 days— but who among us has not heard of the 12 days of Christmas? So, the Christmas season lasts until the Epiphany, January 6th.

Additionally, the time from Epiphany until the Feast of the Baptism of the Christ can also be included as part of the Christmas season. The Epiphany is a fixed date, January 6th, and the Baptism of the Christ is celebrated on the octave day of Epiphany, the 13th.

But the cultural take on Christmas is so predominant in our minds it leaves little room for the *reality* of the *Christian* story of Christmas. I was recently reminded of the enormous cultural influence on the Christian Christmas story because of something I was doing in the course of my regular work concerning Advent and Christmas right now. Pastors and church musicians, you see, need to work on Advent and Christmas services early or we will never be ready when the seasons are on our doorstep.

In this church most of the time we do our own bulletin covers in part because we have talented members who are photographers and artists. They supply the artwork. And Cheri Willard, our Parish Coordinator, can make our computers do back flips, so we digitize these works of art for our bulletin covers.

That having been said, I still check out catalogues for seasonal covers. And it came to pass that I was looking at the seasonal bulletin covers for Advent and Christmas to see if any were useable. "To see if any are useable" is the key term here.

As I am sure you know, we tend to use inclusive language here. That knocks out any pre-printed cover with a banner

that inappropriately uses masculine gender.

But then there is a larger concern. There were bunches of covers which depicted a star and a manger scene. Others had outlines of figures, some clearly meant to be Mary and Joseph, a donkey, a star. Others had the *Magi* around a manger. Other had the *Magi*, a manger and angels who were clearly singing. All of these are inappropriate.

Why? Because they mix up the Gospel of Luke and the Gospel of Matthew and mush them together, as if they were one. These two Gospels contain very different stories written at different times to different audiences.

The next time you pick up your Bible, please read the first two chapters of Matthew. You will find a star. You will find the *Magi*. You will find Herod, priests. But you will find no manger.

In secular culture the *Magi* are sometimes called the “Three Wise Men, despite the fact that there is no reference to either their number or gender in Scripture. Further, based on the story being told in Matthew it seems pretty clear the *Magi* would have arrived in Bethlehem quite a bit after the birth of the Messiah. While nothing is stated directly, it’s likely Jesus was already a toddler.

Also, please note: out of the four Gospels there are only two Nativity stories. That’s because it seems unlikely the birth of the Messiah was as important to the culture when the New Testament was recorded as it does to our culture today. Now, once you have looked at Matthew, please turn to Luke.

Start at Luke 1:1 and read through Luke 2:40. You will not find any star. You will not find any *Magi*. You will find the lowly and the outcast, the shepherds. In Biblical times they would have been lowly and outcast and the birth is announced to them.

By the way, read the words of the angels carefully. It does not say they sing anything. It does say the angels speak the words, “Glory to God.” But nowhere does it say the angels sing. To be clear, I think it’s probable the angels sing. But that’s not what’s written in Scripture.

So, where does all this come from— *Magi* at the manger, a star, singing angels, etc., etc., etc. These things are not Biblical ideas. These are not found in Scripture. These are not addressed in Christian story, the Biblical story.

These are found only in our cultural and its icons. Yes, we take great comfort in what the cultural story says. Personally, I take greater comfort in what the Christian story says, in what Scripture actually says.

That leaves the obvious question. If you take the two nativity stories and separate them (which is the way they were meant to be considered), what is being conveyed?

I want to suggest the Christmas stories convey a singular message. God is breaking into the world. God stands with us. In Jesus, the Messiah, God invites us to see new ways, new life, new freedom, new hope, new peace, new love, new joy for God *is* with us. God and the covenant of God is present with us on our journey.

So, what can I say? See you in church where we reach out to one another in love and support once another in confidence that the covenant God offers is real and that God is near.

Historian Notes

Rev. John Van Epps

John C. Van Epps was born in Syracuse, June 6, 1948. He graduated as valedictorian of his class at Phoenix High School in 1966. John then graduated Phi Beta Kappa, from Colgate University cum laude 1970. The summer of 1972 he worked in Clinical Pastoral Education at Binghamton State Hospital, Binghamton, NY. Then in 1973 John graduated from Colgate-Rochester Divinity School with a Master of Divinity.

Van Epps then furthered his education with a family counseling seminar May 1976 and a program of family counseling techniques and ministries. He also completed Biblical Preaching Seminars in September of 1977 and June of 1978.

Rev. Van Epps was ordained June 17, 1973 by the Oneida Association of the New York Conference of the United Church of Christ and became Pastor of the Trinity United Church of Christ, Rome, NY on August 1, 1973. Rev Van Epps was active in the Oneida Association, of the New York Conference, holding numerous positions. He was active in the Rome community and was a Rotarian.

After the resignation of the Rev Donald Esslinger who had accepted a call to Bethany United Church of Christ in Bethlehem, PA, the process of finding a new minister for UCC Norwich began. In the fall of 1978 the pastoral search committee was successful in finding Rev. John Van Epps, who had served for five years in Rome NY. Rev. Epps started his new positon on Jan 1, 1979 as the 31st minister.

In the spring of 1982 the Rev. Van Epps announced his engagement to Belinda Fiorilli. Belinda, an ordained pastor in the United Church of Christ, was at that point serving as the Associate Pastor at the First Congregational Church in Ithaca. The wedding setting was The United Church of Christ

of Norwich, NY.

The celebration of the marriage of the Reverend Belinda Ann Fiorilli and Reverend John Charles Van Epps happened on June 26, 1982. Belinda was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dominic Fiorilli of Willoughby, Ohio, and John, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Harold Van Epps of Phoenix, NY. The service was performed by the Reverend Dr. Judith Hjorth, Associate Conference Minister for the Upstate Region of the New York Conference. Hence, this church was in her area. (Editor's note: it's small world. Judy retired in the Seattle area and was already at and lived in the neighborhood when our own Bob and Martha O'Keefe arrived for retirement.)

May 17, 1987, Rev Van Epps resigned and his offered his last sermon was titled "Greater Works Than These." The sermon mentions the first time an outside group used the church on a regular basis was arranged before he came. That was the Gathering Place. It was hoped to be temporary, but that turned out to be nine years. Others also started to use the building: the Community Nursery School, the Family Counseling Ministry, Head Start, Planned Parenthood, Friends of Hospice, the Nuclear Freeze, Recitals and others.

Renovations were needed and after they were complete the church was used more and not only by church groups but the community.

Rev Van Epps spoke of the church as a "living stone of the people involved." Also that we are living stones, "personally, as we strive to put our faith into practice, as we get involved personally in the community." His concern was that members were involved in the community but not the church. Over time the church became more involved in the community. Some of the programs are still in existence: the ecumenical Food Pantry, the Thanksgiving baskets and The Place. We continue to provide financial support and continue to find ways to become personally involved, thus "putting our faith into practice, because both go hand in hand."

"In the text today there is the phrase – 'you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people.' We are the church together as one body of many equal parts. One

of the hallmarks of our church here, for better or worse, is our free-flow, horizontal, congregational style. There are a variety of groups and programs meeting: there are a variety of boards and committees (we have one hundred different elected positions in our church). It's almost an overwhelming opportunity for involvement by any and all."

"Yet we should not rest on our laurels, but rather seek to do greater works than these as Jesus said to his disciples – to move into new and different directions."

The Rev Van Epps resigned after eight and one-half years to take a call with Belinda as co-pastors of the Rocky Hill Congregational Church in Connecticut. They were to share equally the preaching and worship. Belinda had the primary responsibility of parish care and support groups, John was responsible for Christian education, thus enabling him the opportunity to pursue that area of interest.

Rev John Van Epps left Norwich June 16 for that new position In CT to start July 1, 1987. The Farewell Dinner Party for John and Belinda was June 13. They were given a monetary gift to use toward furnishing their new home.

Pastor Wheatley has been a parish pastor for 31 years and has found that most conflicts in the church communities as well as in business, committee work, and volunteer activities come from a lack of understanding about healthy boundaries. As she faced conflicts and tensions in her ministries she researched and developed this workshop for her ELCA church communities.

Boundaries are not just for the separation of countries and states, or defining which section of the lawn is yours to mow and not your neighbors. We place boundaries on class times, when one must retire, length of play, how long one may serve in a position, on what or with whom we will share, use of medicines, benefits for employees, and use of supplies. Boundaries may be made of a line or wall we can see, laws we can read, or ideas and customs that cannot be seen.

Very importantly boundaries facilitate cooperation and reduce conflict. They lay a foundation for planning, policies, and negotiation. Pastor Wheatley will be presenting the sections of her workshop that will be of use to everyone, and will not be including the sections that are necessary for pastors. This workshop was for many of us an “eye-opening” and very useful experience, and we would like to make it possible for you to share in the understanding too!

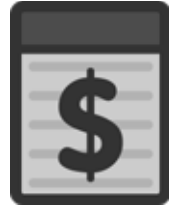

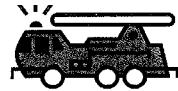
