From the Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,

The announcement below was in our bulletins on February 26th and March 5th.

LENT AND EASTER: LITURGICAL TRIVIA?

The English word Lent is a shortened form of the Old English word len(c)ten which means “spring season.” In Greek and Latin, however, the term clearly signifies the period dating from the 40th day before Easter. Indeed, you have probably often heard it said there are 40 days in Lent. There are, on the other hand, six weeks in Lent but, if there are seven days in a week, that’s 42 days. So, how does that math work? You take those 42 days and subtract the six days which are Sundays. Sundays are considered days of celebration and historically, in the church, were not days on which people fasted. Hence, Sundays are not really considered to be a part of Lent. But once Sundays are subtracted out, that leaves 36 days. To get back to 40, you then add the four days between Ash Wednesday and the First Sunday in Lent— Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday— and there you have it: 36 plus 4 equals 40.

On a related topic, why was the season of Epiphany so long this year? Easter is a moveable feast, in part, because it is calculated from the Lunar Calendar. The calculation which sets Easter is that it must fall on the First Sunday **AFTER** the first full moon **AFTER** the Vernal Equinox, the Spring Equinox. The Spring Equinox can happen on March 19th or 20th or 21st. This year it is on March 20th. The full moon before the equinox this year is on March 12th, a little more than a week before the equinox. The next one is on April 11th. So this year Easter falls on the Sunday after that, April the 16th.

Time— or at least how we count time— is, in a real sense, a human creation. Before the advent of the Roman Empire a Lunar Calendar was a fairly standard method of counting time. The Julian calendar (so called because it was proposed by Julius Caesar) took effect in the year we would call 45 B.C.E. It reformed the Roman calendar (a lunar calendar) used at that point. The Julian Calendar had one big problem. It had 365

days but no leap year.

The Gregorian Calendar, the calendar most widely used internationally today, is named for Pope Gregory XIII, who introduced it in 1582. This calendar added the leap year.

Of course, that leap year thing is tricky. Every year that is exactly divisible by four is a leap year *except* for years that are exactly divisible by 100. But these century years are leap years only if they are not exactly divisible by 400. For example, the years 1700, 1800, and 1900 were not leap years, but the years 1600 and 2000 were.

Why is that? The real solar year (the time it takes for the Earth to circumnavigate the Sun), is 365.2425 days long. The mathematical formula, especially the leap year formula, represented in the Gregorian Calendar largely deals with the fact that the rate at which our planet spins is not well correlated to the rate at which it circles the star known as the Sun.

The Gregorian Calendar was adopted by Spain, Portugal, France, Italy, the Catholic Low Countries and Luxemburg in 1582, when it was introduced. But England (and, thereby, its colony more commonly known as America) waited until 1752. Turkey waited until 1926 to adopt its use. That brings me back to my statement about time— or at least how we count it— time is a human invention.

Each week at the start of our Sunday service I will say something like this: “Welcome to our service of worship on this, the Seventh Sunday after the Epiphany, known in some traditions as the Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time. Today is February 19th, 2017 on the secular calendar and we are in year ‘A’ of the three year lectionary cycle.”

Church time, the seasons of the church, are as much a human invention as any other way of counting time. But the church dates and seasons are also different than “secular time.”

The tacit point I attempt to make by announcing exactly what it says on the church calendar is that our time, church time, is different. And when we enter our time of worship on Sundays we need to leave our daily life behind and enter into God’s time.

Yes, the reality of the world does pour through our doors, sometimes frighteningly so and sometimes in upsetting ways. But, again, I hope the point of concentrating on church time, is

to help us understand that God's time is a way to have a brief respite, a way to give some separation from the distractions of a sometimes frightening and upsetting secular time, the sometimes frightening and upsetting secular life. Finally, I believe the best reason for observing and recognizing church time is church time helps us fully realize how we count time is only a human construct. Indeed, I think when we realize this thing called counting time is a human construct that helps us set aside church time as a period of and a place for renewal and refreshment.

All of which is to say (as I often say) "See you in church." Church—a place for God's time and perhaps even for God's timing.

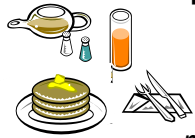

There are Sunday adult classes meeting in the Chapel and Bible Study most Wednesday evenings led by Pastor Joe. *We* are never too young or old to learn and explore our faith in new and exciting ways. Historian Notes

REV. JOHN KOOPMAN

Rev. John Koopman was hired as the Director of Youth and Children's Ministries in the United Church of Christ, Norwich, NY in December 1994. He had been ordained and recognized as a minister in the American Baptist Churches USA since June 1973.

John completed his UCC studies in 1997 in order to receive "Privilege of Call," which means he could apply for any open position in the United Church of Christ. In order for him to gain "standing" or "credentialing" in the UCC, he needed to be granted a "call" by a local church. The United Church of Christ in Norwich, NY, was very aware of John's capabilities and abundant gifts as a minister. It was seen as both wise and gracious to recognize someone in the church's midst, who had already been recognized for his abilities. On June 22, 1997 the United Church of Christ, Norwich NY voted to offer a call to Rev. Koopman to serve as the Minister of Christian Nurture. His duties were part-time and were not limited to just Christian education. John was formally recognized and installed as Minister of Christian Nurture on January 18, 1998. He served in this position until 2006.

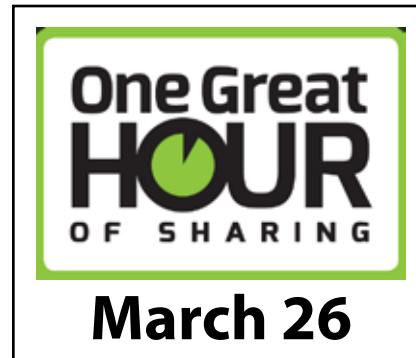
In 2006 he accepted a call as the part-time Pastor at the Bainbridge NY First Baptist Church, where he served until 2014. When he accepted the call in Bainbridge, he decreased his hours at UCC in Norwich and became the Minister of Youth from 2006-2012.

Rev. Koopman was also a part-time prison chaplain at Camp Pharsalia Correctional Facility in South Plymouth, NY and Camp Georgetown Correctional Facility in Madison County, NY, both minimum security correctional facilities, from 1996-2011.

In 2012, John was accepted by the Broome Council of Churches to serve as chaplain in the UHS (United Health Services)





hospitals in Binghamton, NY. He continues to serve in that position at the present. He and his wife Leslie, a retired teacher, live in Greene, NY. They have three grown daughters and several grandchildren.

Rev. Koopman optimized his time and expanded his horizon to support numerous diverse people, from the young, local congregations, the wayward, the ill and grieving. He has been an able and very capable minister to tend to all in need. His passion has contributed to this community on many levels.



One Great Hour of Sharing, as part of Our Churches Wider Mission, is the special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that carries God's message of love and hope to people in crisis. The UCC works with international partners to provide sources of clean
