From the Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,

I recently heard a lecture which said good leaders proclaim what they are for, not what they are against. The lecture said one of the best modern examples of that was in the preaching and the teaching and writing of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

I need to be clear about the nomenclature of a proclaiming what Christians are for. You see, sometimes proclaiming what we are for falls under the heading of what historically has been called a "Confession of Faith."

I know: for many the word confession sounds like an admission of guilt. But (again historically) the first meaning of "Confession" was "a statement setting out religious doctrine" or "an organized religious body having a common creed."

This kind of Confession— a statement setting out religious doctrine— was recently published by some church leaders. That document is way too long for this space. But since I think I try to tell people what I am for, not what I am against, I will use it, record some of it below. So I am clear about this, I have edited that published Statement of Confession considerably.

It is time to be followers of Jesus before anything else—race, nationality, party, ethnicity, gender, geography. Identity in Christ precedes all other identities. "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:35).

(I am adding a note not in the published Confession here: if that is the case, then these precepts should follow as statements of belief, a Confession.)

I. WE BELIEVE each human is made in the image and likeness of God (Genesis 1:26). That confers a divinely decreed dignity, worth, a God-given equality to all of us as children of the One God, the Creator of all things. To hold otherwise is to say the image of God is not all of us. Our participation in the

global community of Christ prevents any toleration of bigotry. Justice and healing are biblical and theological issues for us, central to the mission of the body of Christ. We give thanks for the prophetic role of churches when they have called us to be faithful.

II. WE BELIEVE we are one body. In Christ, there is no oppression based on race, gender, identity or class (Galatians 3:28). The body of Christ, where those great human divisions are to be overcome, is meant to be an example for the rest of society.

III. WE BELIEVE how we treat the hungry, the thirsty, the naked, the stranger, the sick, the prisoner is how we treat Christ. (Matthew 25: 31-46) "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." God calls us to protect and seek justice for those who are poor and vulnerable. God made us all equal in divine dignity and love. Our proclamation of Jesus, the Christ, is tied to solidarity with the most vulnerable.

IV. WE BELIEVE truth is central to personal and public lives, central to the prophetic biblical tradition, a vocation which includes speaking the Word of God to the society. A commitment to speaking truth is a part of the Decalogue, "You shall not bear false witness" (Exodus 20:16), and it is foundational.

V. WE BELIEVE the leadership of Christ is servant-hood. Jesus said, "You know that the rulers of the Gentiles (the world) hold it over them. Their great ones are tyrants over them. It will not be so among you; but whoever wishes to be great among you must be your servant" (Matthew 20:25-26).

VI. WE BELIEVE that the Jesus, the Christ, tells us to go into all nations making disciples (Matthew 28:18). Our churches, our nations, are part of an international community whose interests always surpass boundaries. The most well-known verse in the New Testament starts with "For God so loved the

world" (John 3:16). We, in turn, should love and serve the world and all its inhabitants.

One might argue this statement of confession, taken as a whole, does proclaim, does make statements which are against a multitude of things. But I believe that reading would suggest the other kind of "confession." That reading would be an admission of guilt, guilt on the part of the world, that there is implicit in this Confession constant violations in the world, by the world, of what Christians hold to be true.

One final note: dogma is what someone tells you you need to believe. Doctrine, on the other hand, is simply an explanation of what you believe.

I have often said we, in the United Church of Christ, have absolutely no dogma. No person, no "Confession" tells us what we need to believe.

But we, in the United Church of Christ, have a ton of doctrine. We like to explain what we believe... and explain and explain and explain. Confessions are simply an explanation of beliefs.

That having been said, "See you in church." Church— a place that is always about proclaiming what we are for.

Once again, the Norwich community is organizing an Honors Banquet, the 21st annual, to celebrate the scholars of the Norwich High School graduating class. The dinner will be held on Tuesday, June 19th.

The committee is pleased to announce that **Gretchen Parker Walsh** (NHS, class of **1989**), will address the students being honored. As you may be aware, all the speakers over the years have graduated from the Norwich City School District, furthered their education and returned to serve the Community.

Gretchen holds a Bachelor of Science in Marketing and Economics from Babson College located in Wellesley, Massachusetts. She is the Team Leader and CEO of Keller Williams Upstate NY Properties and along with her husband Kevin owns and operates the Parker Walsh Real Estate Team in Norwich.

Needless to say, this is not so much about the speaker as it is about the students. The scholars we honor achieve an average of 90 or above in their high school career. At the dinner each student is called forward individually and given a certificate which recognizes their accomplishment.

Based on experience we expect the cost of the project to be around \$4,500. 
