# From the Pastor

### **Fieldstones**







This time of year, area farmers' fields already have one crop in abundance: fieldstones – some large, some small and flat, still others of various shapes and sizes. I've lived across from one such field for decades and a new crop of fieldstones never fails to come up each spring. When the farmer plows the field, you can hear his plow blades hit the stones, sometimes with a small "ting," sometimes with a jarring ring.

That can't be good for the plow, but the farmer keeps coming back, plows the field, then finally plants his crop. He might plant corn, soybeans with sunflowers along the edge of the field, or alfalfa and clover. The alfalfa and clover allow the soil to rest and recover after the previous year's plantings. Even then, the farmer cuts the alfalfa and clover every few weeks, taking the crop back to feed his cows.

With all of the fieldstones coming up each year, what if the farmer said, "Enough! No matter how many stones I remove each spring, more take their place. My equipment and I can't take it!" There were several years during the pandemic when the field wasn't plowed. The farmer still came by at times to cut hay. After all, his cows still needed to eat, however, hay isn't a major cash crop on its own. And fieldstones most definitely aren't in demand. If my neighbor is going to continue being a farmer, he'll need to plow again this spring. And one of the conditions he'll face is dealing with a fresh supply of fieldstones.

How about us? In our own lives, there are always fieldstones (challenges) that arise on a daily basis. As with farming, challenges come with life. As difficult as they may be, the challenges we face become even more difficult when we carry them from one day to the next. Imagine what our own fields would look like if we insisted on bringing yesterday's challenges with us to add to the new challenges that will inevitably come up today. It wouldn't take long for our fields to be covered in fieldstones, with no room for our crops to grow.

What to do? First, realize that life, like farming, has a never-ending supply of challenges. They're part of the experience. Second, stop insisting on carrying yesterday's challenges into today. Give them to God: "Lord, I can't carry this burden / problem / challenge / fieldstone any longer. I'm giving it to you." That doesn't mean you won't have new challenges in life, but by handing over what you can no longer carry, you'll have – with God's help – the strength to deal with what comes along today.

On the topic of farming, Jesus used agrarian imagery in many of his parables. He noted there were crops ready for harvesting, but few people to do the work. No doubt that will feel all too familiar for a small community of faith such as Norwich. I know there's behind-the-scenes work being done to help get the work of the church done. As that happens, an important question for all of us will always be, "How does what we're doing serve God?" Answering that question will include dealing with the fieldstones / challenges that come with serving God, however, let's also imagine what we can do with God's help. To that end, I'll look forward to seeing how God provides inspiration for us in the weeks and months ahead.

## From the Deacons

God won't give you something you can't handle. We've all heard this popular phrase. The sentiment most likely comes from 1 Corinthians 10:13 where Paul says God "will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear." I have been challenged chairing the Board of Deacons. And I've been wondering how to handle being in a position in the church that seems to require more time and energy than I can give. Many questions and answers run through my mind. However, I am learning to ask the question, "What would Jesus do?" Other questions that come to my mind are – Is this really necessary? Who am I serving, my ego or the church? And why did I take this on? Ultimately, I am looking at this as an opportunity to learn and grow.

When I think about all these questions, I am reminded of the changes our church leadership is working on. Currently there are three committees, each with fewer than the required number of members and often meeting without a quorum. The proposed updated by-laws will combine the Deacons, the Trustees and the Executive Council into one leadership body which will keep the title of Executive Council. This change makes it possible for anyone who is committed to the church (not just covenant members) to have the opportunity to choose to take on responsibilities where they feel called to serve. (Members will vote on this change on April 28<sup>th</sup>.) This is thinking outside of the box, and I love these ideas that allow everyone to be involved and grow.

### **Deacons Fund Update**

Already this year we have received many requests for assistance from members of the community and the church. We are grateful and blessed to have the funds in the budget to be able to offer help. This is a list of help we have given since January:

- Rental assistance for someone to move into a safer apartment.
- Avoid a shut-off and bring the account balance to current for a domestic violence survivor.
- A dumpster for cleaning up after a house fire.
- Aldi gift cards for a family who unexpectedly took in four children.
- Fees for a Christian camp this summer for two middle-school age boys.
- House a homeless man for seven days at a local hotel, splitting the cost with First Baptist Church.
- A part of the past-due amount to avoid shut-off from NYSEG for an individual, working with Emmanual Episcopal Church Mission Outreach.

The Oehme Family gave a generous gift in memory and honor of Linda L. Oehme for a new Youth Ministries Room. The old Youth Room was remodeled and updated last year and is now used for both Sunday School and Youth Group. Linda served as our Director of Children and Youth Ministries from September 2012 until she passed away in October of 2022. The inscription on the plaque reads: "For her tireless dedication, unending love and unmatched passion in sharing and showing God's love and promise for all of God's children."

In December 2022, we received a generous gift from the Estate of Marcia Stewart. Marcia had been a member of this church from 1904 until her death in 1987. She joined at the age of 15 and in 1950, became the first woman to serve as the Moderator. A portion of her bequest was used to construct a sound booth and to improve the quality of our livestream with an upgrade to the sound, computer and video equipment in the Nave.


