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From the Pastor

Summer Gardens



"Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is alive and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you, O you of little faith? Therefore do not be anxious, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the Gentiles seek after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you.

"Therefore do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble. (Matthew 6:28b-34)

Here in central New York, one of the iconic flowers of summer is now in bloom: the tiger lily. Its bright orange flowers seem to be everywhere at once: roadsides, gardens, open fields. Wherever there's a patch of sunlight, you'll probably find tiger lilies in bloom. An interesting quality about the plant is each of its flowers last only one day. Each day, a new flower blooms, fades away, then is replaced by another flower the next day. It only seems as if a lily patch is always in bloom because it keeps producing new flowers to replace the flowers that bloomed yesterday. Each flower is unique and as Jesus noted, more splendid than the robes of King Solomon, even if - and perhaps because - its beauty is fleeting. It's also worth noting Jesus reminds his followers it's the Gentiles (ie. non-Jews, that is, us), who are constantly worried about what they'll eat, drink, or wear. He then reminds them God is aware of their needs and will provide for them accordingly. Instead of worrying about today or tomorrow, "seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness." "Oh, you of little faith."

In one of my previous sermons, I shared another image of the kingdom of God: the gardens of God. In a sense, each of us is growing our own little garden of God. Likewise, a faith community is growing a community garden, a collective effort to nurture what's needed to be of benefit to the larger community in which it finds itself. Too often, though, as individuals and as communities of faith, we get distracted by the "busy work" of gardening to the point of forgetting to appreciate what we're growing. Yes, it's important to be mindful of the weeds, slugs, and other annoyances that find their way into any garden, but it's also important to remember why we planted the garden in the first place as well as what it is we're growing. It takes just as much effort to nurture a hurt or grudge or ongoing bad relationship as it does to learn from previous experience then focus on a new planting with new leaves and new buds ready to flower. Yes, those slugs were annoying, but get some slug treatment so they don't come back, then get back to helping your garden thrive.

Here in upstate New York, the growing season is relatively short. The same is true in life. So then, what are you growing in your garden of God this summer? And what are we as a community of faith growing that will be of benefit to the community around us this summer and beyond?

Message from the Moderator

With summer now upon us, I am sure people are thinking about enjoying the warm weather, taking vacations, visiting families, having picnics, playing golf, and enjoying parties. With all these wonderful thoughts and plans for the summer I would also like to remind you that the work of the church does not just stop for the summer. We have taken some important actions to get us from what I call "lost", to now "under control". This looks like having a person to regularly perform the worship message on Sunday mornings, adjustments to the by-laws adjusting our leadership structure to better match our active membership, and having a plan for this structure with action committees for addressing the behind the scenes work of keeping the church functioning and meeting the commitments and obligations to our faith community as well as the greater community (our neighbors).

As I look forward to the next couple of months, I see the need to continue on the path of searching for and selecting our next settled pastor. What does that really look like you say? Well, the leadership has been discussing this path forward and with some support from the Association, have decided to accept support from Joanne Ferguson, M.S., C.A.S., Family Counselor and Licensed Lay Minister to help guide us through the process of understanding and acceptance of the resignation of Pastor Jason and to help us realize our opportunities and potential as a small congregation. This work is intended to involve the whole congregation in a session of discussion where people can express concerns and questions needed to reconcile the circumstances of the past 6-12 months. In addition, it is intended to also help us all understand our capability and possibilities as a small congregation who really does want to share the message for God. Your will hear more about all of this in the coming weeks.

As moderator, I look forward to these coming weeks/months with both concern and excitement. I do feel that the next 6-12 months in the church have the capability to re-energize our faith community and become a place people want to be a part of and be willing to come to because we offer something that makes them feel good, not just because it is a family tradition or expectation. The concern part of my feelings come from the undemonstrated process of the leadership structure. This structure requires a variety of action committees, linked to the Executive Council, who will be supporting the work behind the scenes. The Executive Council will not be the only folks doing the work but will rely on many other people for support with these tasks. So with that thought, I am requesting we all keep an open mind on how we can be involved with the action committees to do a small part of completing the whole picture. Like I have said in previous communications "many hands make light work". Currently, we are pulling together a Transition Committee for evaluating our current profile. We have five people identified and are looking for an additional two to fill this committee. Following this work, a Search Committee will need to be established and we are currently asking for anyone interested in getting involved in that process to let me or someone on the leadership team know your interest.

We as a Church are fortunate to have a strong financial foundation which will support the work we choose to do. Unlike other churches who spend much effort in fundraising, we can direct our effort towards the actions and directives to make a difference in people's lives. There are many challenges within our community, some with no easy fixes. As I think about this I remember the joke about how to eat an elephant,...one bite at a time. We <u>can</u> make a difference. Just like a snowball rolling downhill, it is likely to grow bigger and gain speed. Who knows what it will become.



From the Deacons

Temperatures soaring near 100 degrees in June presented many challenges, and it made me look for the good that could come from it. The warm weather made the plants take off and grow in abundance when the rain came down in multiple showers day after day. The garden delivered — flowers galore and strawberries and other tiny plants gave a treat for our vegetable patches.

I give thanks to our Triune God, for all the gifts he has blessed us with, including the ability to adjust our thinking and plans. In June I, like others, learned to think out of the box, which brought us to the point where we know that with God all things are possible.

There has been a stability in attendance and outstanding musical presentations, increase in livestreaming, and the continued ability to respond to needs of those who request help financially and otherwise. We have had prayer requests from outside the church family - from next door to out of state, Mexico and Jamaica, to name a few. We have also been able to serve with financial help to other churches as requested.

Since the last newsletter, the Deacons Fund has been used to:

- Help with a past due electric bill
- Joined with another church and another organization to help pay part of a large past-due account at NYSEG
- Supported the LGBTQ+ booth at the NYS Fair through FAIRNY (see below for details)
- Paid for a gas test to get a home re-connected to gas service after a fire.

FAIRNY at the NYS Fair

FAIRNY (Fairness Alliance and Information Resource of New York, Inc.) hosts an LGBTQ Booth at the NYS Fair in Syracuse and coordinates community participation in the annual Pride Day at the Fair. The booth provides information and resources on issues ranging from bullying of LGBTQ youth, discrimination facing members of the LGBTQ community in employment, housing and health issues, GENDA, marriage equality and protection of LGBTQ families. The booth is a highly visible space that welcomes the general public as well as members of the LGBTQ community, as we work to promote inclusion and diversity.

Volunteers are also needed to staff the booth, the resource fair, and the new family/youth space on Pride Day as well as setting up and tearing down.


With that said, there is work to be done on the front porch before we can safely get people inside. The interior has weathered well, and just needs a good cleaning.

The New York Conference, UCC Service Project Announced

Last year's period pack project taught us just how much good we can accomplish when churches work together on one purpose across the conference. After quadrupling our initial goal, it seems it is time for our next project. So this year we are asking churches across the NY Conference to create pollinator gardens.

I am hopeful that this project is a chance for inter-generational mission. It may be a great opportunity to reconnect with the created world while working for Creation Justice. One out of every three bites of food we eat depends on pollinators. Unfortunately, pollinator populations are declining because of habitat loss, pesticides, and climate change. We can provide pollinators with more of the habitat they desperately need by planting pollinator gardens at our churches.

A pollinator garden is a haven for creatures like bees, butterflies, and birds. It is a place where native plants provide food and shelter for these vital pollinators. For us, it can be a place where our children learn about nature, science, and stewardship while working in community on a common mission. It can be a place where we remind ourselves of humankind's first mission as described in our Sacred Story - tending the garden.

The pollinator gardens created by our churches are sure to be as varied as our churches are. Some churches will have the space and people power to create large gardens. Others will have space for a container garden on the steps of the church building. Every little bit helps for struggling pollinators. Every little bit is a faithful act of Creation Justice.

I know this is more involved than last year's period pack project. Gardens are not a one-and-done event. They are an on-going creative endeavor. It would be great to see 20 churches establish new pollinator gardens by our next Annual Meeting in 2025. Since we cannot exactly bring the gardens to Annual Meeting, we are going to need photos to celebrate our work together. Please send photos of the gardens as you are working on them to pollinator@uccny.org. This is also a great place to share creative ideas related to pollinator gardens that we can share with other churches. I am

excited to see what you come up with.

If you need a little help getting started, follow the QR code or visit fws.gov/story/how-build-pollinator-garden. It will take you to a U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service website that provides step-by-step instructions for how to build your pollinator garden. Let us use this year to make our world a little greener, a little more vibrant, and a lot more alive!


