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### **Being Relentless Advocates**

These past few weeks, we've been looking at how to maintain a sense of stability in one's life by taking care of ourselves physically, mentally, and spiritually – essentially getting an early start on our New Year's resolutions. That way, by this time next month, we'll be much more likely to follow through on them for the foreseeable future. As we do so, a question we might ask is, "To what end?" That is, "Why are we doing this?" Not feeling tossed around by the storms in life is important, however, there's something to be said about using the time to get ready for the rainbows that often follow those storms – or even appear in the midst of them.

On the topic of storms in life, early in my ministry I was an on-call chaplain at our local hospital. From the caregivers with whom I interacted – nurses, especially – I learned two important facts: 1) You (either patient or family) must be relentless in advocating for yourself or your loved one. While everyone wants you / your loved one to be well again, it's your responsibility to demand answers to your questions about how to achieve that goal. 2) Patients who are a royal pain-in-the-ass stand the best chance of recovering. Yes, they make caregivers' lives miserable, but they're also (secretly) admired by their caregivers as the patients who will most likely leave the hospital alive. Those patients who were quiet and docile? Their outcome was *much* less positive. And if there was a coffee cart outside of a patient's room – the coffee cart of death? Death was imminent.

Coming back to our own lives, while we work to gird ourselves for the uncertainties – and storms – next year will bring, now is the time to ask, "What does a healthy society look like and how can I help ensure that outcome?" More specifically, "What does a healthy society look like for the most vulnerable?" Remember how I told you about the person who called to thank the church for a pair of socks in her Thanksgiving box? A pair of socks?! My heart broke when I heard that. Then there was the person who called to say their house burned down, they lost everything, and their Thanksgiving box was the only food they had after that disaster. Heartbreak again. "But those needs are so easy to meet," we sigh!

Throughout Scripture, we find examples of God being concerned about "the least of these" in society. Jesus called them "members of my family." If Jesus claimed the marginalized – the sick, lonely, naked, those in prison, homeless (and others) – as members of his family, then it's imperative we do the same, especially if society doesn't seem willing to see them as worthy of esteem or, even worse, regards them as subhuman. One of my mantras to someone on the receiving end of abuse is, "The most loving thing you can say to anyone who is abusing you is, 'Enough! This abuse stops now!'" Unfortunately, the power difference between abuser and someone being abused is the latter doesn't have the strength to be an advocate for him- or herself. That's when we as people of faith have the responsibility to step in and say, "Enough!" Advocating for "the least of these" has been – and always will be – one of the most sacred responsibilities we have as people who model ourselves after the man whose birth we'll be celebrating in a few weeks. Let's gird ourselves to take that responsibility seriously – and relentlessly – now and for the foreseeable future until Jesus comes back again.


